First Reading Isaiah 53:10-11
Psalm 19 "Lord, let your mercy be upon us,
 as we place our trust in you."

Second Reading Hebrews 4:14-16
Gospel: Mark 10:35-45

Throughout Ordinary Time, the Old Testament reading orients us the Gospel's principal point. This weekend, Isaiah describes God's servants as having "borne our infirmities and carried our sufferings." For Christians, this servant is Jesus, bearer of our sins. But the disciples fail to understand that true greatness consists of imitating Jesus' humble service of others. Fortunately though, as the second reading from Hebrews teaches, Jesus is our merciful high priest, tested in every way we are, and thus able to sympathize with our weaknesses.

Things That Money Can't Buy

Years ago an American Journalist wrote, "It is good to have money and the things that money can buy, but we had better check once in a while to make sure we are not losing the things that money cannot buy." It is not a new emphasis. It goes back to Jesus and his apostles and even the Old Testament Prophets. But it seems to have special application to our day, because ours is one of the most financially minded eras in history. We tend to measure and evaluate everything in terms of the economic. Money can fix anything for us. It would be foolish to underrate the importance of the economic side of life. In our modern world, money is not simply money. Money is food on the table, and a roof over the head. It is education for the children and books, sports and music. It is health for those we love in time of sickness. It is old age relieved from the prospect of haunting penury. We live in a world where success is defined in financial terms. So it would be foolish to minimize the importance of life's economies underpinning.

We concede the importance of the things that money can buy yet in the long run, it is the things that money cannot buy that determine the quality of our life. The young man in the Gospel today (Mk. 10:17-30) failed to see that. He was very wealthy. No doubt he had all of the things that money could buy in the world. But in his obsession with economics he lost the eternal quality of life. You cannot buy the quality of life with any amount of money. You cannot purchase in any market genuine love and affection or deathless hope. Likewise, a character, unselfishness, service mentality, faith in God, and compassion for others—none of these can be explained in terms of money.

The French have a story about a millionaire, who spent his days counting his gold coins. Next to his door, there lived a poor but a happy cobbler who spent his days singing as he repaired people's shoes. The joyful singing of the cobbler irritated the rich man. One day he decided to give some of his gold coins to the cobbler. At first the cobbler was overjoyed and he took the coins and hid them in a secret place. Then his worry and fear started. He was constantly going back to make sure the coins were still there. He feared someone might steal the coins. Consequently, he ceased to sing. He lost his joy and happiness. Worry and fear haunted him. Finally he decided to take the coins back to the rich man. He went to him saying, "Take back your coins and give me back my songs and happiness." Attachment to riches can take away our freedom and joy.

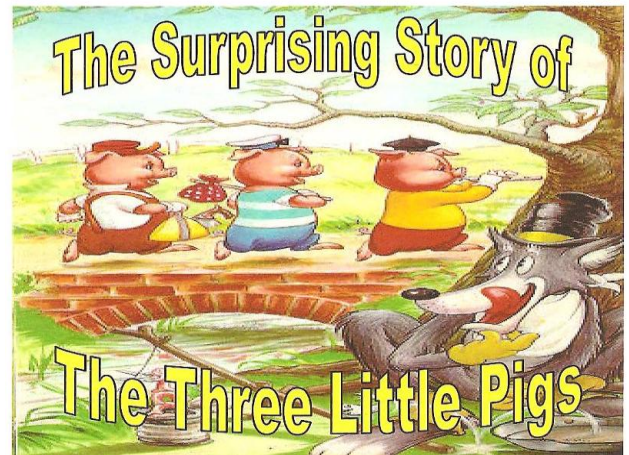
