First Reading: Isaiah 40:1-5, 9-11
Psalm 104 "O Bless the Lord, my soul."
Second Reading: Titus 2:11-14, 3:4-7
Gospel: Luke 3:15-16, 21-22

The readings are a mini-excursion through Advent and Christmas, depositing us on the threshold of Ordinary Time. The reading from Isaiah recalls the Advent message of comfort and hope. Saint Paul proclaims that the grace of God has appeared. In the Gospel we have an adult Jesus being baptized by John, ready for his mission and affirmed by the voice of God. Listen to these words of scripture and let us recall our own Baptism and prepare for whatever God will ask us to do next?

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Happy New Year and happy new beginnings. It is a Sunday where we celebrate and give thanks to God for his revelation of himself in the person of Jesus Christ.

On the first Sunday of the year we celebrate the feast of the Epiphany. It is a Sunday where we celebrate and give thanks to God for his revelation of himself in the person of Jesus Christ. We celebrate a God that extends his hand to connect and relate to us in Jesus. We are grateful for a God who initiates the journey to salvation by sending his Son and revealing himself to the world. We receive the gift of his word in Jesus, words that will lead us to our freedom, healing and restoration. Indeed the birth of Christ is our story, the story that sets the beginnings of our own story of salvation.

Magi, or as well call them, three kings, came from a priestly caste in Persia, now Iran. They were astrologers, and by our standards, are considered scientists. They represent the diverse world of the gentiles. Their gifts speak of their recognition of who Jesus is: gold, a precious metal reserved for royalty (Jesus is kings!), frankincense, a common part of religious rituals, it smoke rises like prayers (Jesus is God!) and myrrh that was used to heal and embalm a dead body (Jesus is healer and will suffer to save the world!)

They paid attention to the stars and were open to new light and new message. They followed the light in search for the new message. Their journey led them to the holy family and encountered Jesus. I contrast Herod's response to the new light was jealousy and selfishness. He was not interested in finding the new light. He wanted to surpress it - to destroy it.

Do we look for and find Jesus? By what signs do we recognize him? How do we feel when we recognize these signs? What do we do?
